- Half the word count (or less) than printed writing

- Users scan in an "F Pattern"
- Highlighted keywords stand out
- Bulleted lists helpful
- Sub-headings should be meaningful not "cute"

The F Pattern

Users read web pages in an F-shaped pattern

- First a long horizontal stripe
- > Then a shorter horizontal stripe
- Then a vertical stripe

Working with Quotes

Introduce the author of the quotation

Lisa Walsh has always cared deeply about children.

"When my husband and I decided it was time to have kids, I quit my job so I could be a full-time mom," said the former worldwide director of travel and transportation for IBM.

OR

"We get along great," said Lauretta. "We have different strengths that we bring to the table."

Working with Quotes

Explain the context

For the Skigens it's all about getting it right—for the kids. "It's important to be accurate and have all the facts to allow these professionals to deal with this particular case in the best way possible," said Lauretta.

OR

"She did all she was court ordered to do and more," Matt reflected on the mother's progress. "I was blown away by how she turned this thing around."

Working with Quotes

OK to begin a quotation in the middle of the sentence The CASA case was "life changing" for Matt.

> OK to use a colon as an introduction:

Frank's advice for incoming advocates: "Learn the system and never be afraid to ask—even if it's for sensitive information. Because what matters is what's best for your CASA kid."

Identify some Pull Quotes

The quote you select should be thought-provoking and engaging, but not too long.

Point of View



Write from the second person

I am the oldest of seven children. We almost took care of ourselves. I was only fourteen, and I felt the weight of the world on my shoulders. Everybody toid us it would be a couple of weeks in foster care but it turned into months, then years.

Suddenly a new person walked into the life of me and my sister. With the constant changing of social workers and counselors, I didn't know what to expect. She asked us what our interests were, and we set up a time to meet every week. For the first time in awhile I felt that this just might be a good thing...

"I now look at people in these situations differently. Prior to my time at CASA, whenever I heard people abused or neglected their children, I would think, 'how do you that?'
